


Sunrise in the Black Hills / Sonrise on New Life

Mornings in the Black Hills of South Dakota hold a quiet majesty that takes one's breath away. As darkness lingers over the rolling hills and towering pines, an expectant hush fills the air. The first light of dawn spills over the rugged peaks, painting the sky in hues of gold, crimson, and violet. Slowly, the darkness recedes, giving way to the warmth and promise of a new day. Those who have witnessed such a sunrise know that it is more than just another morning—it is a moment of awe, a glimpse of glory breaking through the veil of night.

So it was on that first Easter morning. The world is shrouded in darkness-the darkness of sin, the weight of death, and the seeming finality of the tomb. The disciples, still grieved by the suffering and crucifixion of their Lord, cannot yet perceive the dawn that is coming. But then, the first rays of resurrection light burst forth! The stone is rolled away! The grave is empty! Christ has conquered death! And in that moment, the world is changed forever.



The open tomb of Easter is the most glorious sight in all of history, surpassing even the most breathtaking sunrise. Just as the rising sun transforms the Black Hills from shadow to splendor, the resurrection of Jesus transforms our lives from despair to hope, from fear to faith, and from death to eternal life. What seemed final-the tomb, sealed and guarded—is, in reality, only the threshold to the dawn of salvation. Christ's triumph over the grave is the divine Sonrise that never fades, illuminating our path with His truth, His grace, and His victory.

This Easter reality is not merely a historical event; it is our present and eternal hope. When we look upon a sunrise in the Black Hills, we see a reflection of God's faithfulness. Just as the sun rises every morning without fail, so too does the light of Christ shine upon His people, sustaining and strengthening them. Even when clouds obscure the dawn, we know that the sun is still there, just as our faith assures us that Christ remains with us, even in times of suffering and doubt.

The Apostle Paul declares, "For if we have been united with Him in a death like His, we shall certainly be united with Him in a resurrection like His" (Romans 6:5). Baptized into Christ's death and resurrection, we live in His light. The resurrection is not only Christ's victory but also our victory, for He shares His triumph with us. This means that, though we walk through valleys of shadow and trial, we do so with the confidence that our Redeemer lives. Our sins are forgiven. Death has lost its sting. We belong to Christ, and nothing—no darkness, no sorrow, no grave-can separate us from Him.

This Easter, whether you stand in the shadow of the Black Hills or kneel in the quiet of your home, let your heart be lifted by the dawn of resurrection joy. The glory of the open tomb shines brighter than the most dazzling sunrise, and it shines for you. Rejoice, for the night is over, and the Son of Righteousness has risen with healing in His wings (Malachi 4:2). Amen.

DISCIPLESHIP FOCUS: Cornerstone

Did you know one of Zion's community ministries is the Cornerstone Mission? Ruth and Bill Kudera have organized the efforts for Zion's involvement at Cornerstone for more than three years, but according to Ruth, Zion's involvement with Cornerstone started in the 1980's. Over the years, numerous congregation members have been involved with providing a meal for people at the mission, which serves Rapid City's homeless population.

The Cornerstone Mission houses and feeds residents who are homeless, transitioning with jobs, and looking for a home, as well as homeless Veterans. The Mission serves three meals a day to its residents, with the evening meal being open to homeless, non-resident individuals. The evening meal is where Zion comes into play. the Centrol of Centrol

Zion's dedicated team of volunteers helps prepare and serve Cornerstone's evening meal on the second Wednesday and fifth

Monday of each month. This involves meal planning, shopping, preparing and serving. The food served is fairly broad, Ruth said, unless the team receives a notice for special dietary needs, such as dairy-free. Zion picks up the tab for the food while Zion members supply the labor for creating and serving the meals. The budgeted goal is \$100 per meal to serve 125 to 150 people. Many Zion members have donated to this effort in a variety of ways, said Ruth.

You might wonder what it takes to serve a meal. After the menu is determined, the shopping begins. Feeding South Dakota is instrumental in suppling food at reduced prices. Much of the food is purchased the day before or the morning of the day the meal is served. The actual meal prep starts at 3pm at the Mission. The typical day requires six to eight people to help with the prep and the serving of the meal.

According to Ruth, the biggest challenge of this ministry effort is the selection of available foods from Feeding South Dakota. This selection has decreased from six-plus pages to as little as one page of available items. Still, Zion serves a nice variety of nutritious, hot meals that are appreciated by all.

Ruth shared that the mission has never run out of food on nights when Zion cooks and serves. Once all participants have been served, any extra food can be served as seconds or thirds. Serving starts at 6pm and stops at 6:30pm. Remaining leftovers stay at the mission. Clean-up is completed by the mission.

This year Zion has three teams that are competing in D.I. tournaments. We had our first tournament of the year March 15. All three teams took first place in their challenges! CONGREGATION MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: The Herz Family

Bob and Marilyn Herz have a long and well-rounded history with Zion—on both the school and church sides. They recall attending their first wedding in Rapid City at Zion when it was on the corner of 5th and Quincy streets downtown. A couple named Dave and Roxi were getting married.

Little did they know that decades later, Bob Herz and Dave Withee would serve together on church boards, sing together in the church choir and support a major church/school expansion project—the Capital Campaign. Marilyn Herz and Roxi Withee would teach Sunday school for many years. Bob would be Roxi's boss at Zion Lutheran School; Roxi taught Kindergarten at Zion while Bob was principal (and for many years after). (Side note: At the height of Bob's tenure as Zion's school principal, 130 students were enrolled.)

But the Herzes' path to Rapid City wasn't exactly straight. In fact, they moved to Rapid City multiple times, their indemand careers as teachers taking them from one state to another as they raised a family of three children.

Their first move to Rapid City happened in 1980, when Bob was called to Zion as the school principal and full-time

teacher for 5th and 6th grades. That year, they skipped two college graduations on May 9—their own—to fly to Rapid City from Alma, MO, and visit Zion for the first time. Bob would receive a master's degree and Marilyn a bachelors degree, both in the field of education, upon returning to Alma.

Having grown up on a dairy farm in eastern Montana, Marilyn had long wanted to be a church worker. But God had other ideas about how and where she would shine Christ's light. During their first tenure in Rapid City, Marilyn

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substitute taught while their three children—Jason, Jenny and John—were young. All in all, Marilyn taught in public school districts from 1983 to 2007, 17 years at the elementary school level and six years at the middle school. She also served as the Rapid City School District's secondary literacy coordinator.

In 2001, Marilyn was named South Dakota Teacher of the Year. She met President George Bush and attended a week of space camp in Alabama. When she returned, she challenged her students to learn the aspects of a shuttle mission.

Prior to coming to Rapid City, Bob had been a Lutheran school teacher for a long time, teaching in classrooms in Perry County, MO; Shawano, Wisc.; and Alma, MO. During their short stint in Wisconsin, Bob taught the sister of former Zion pastor Ray Hartwig.

Both Bob and Marilyn were raised in the church. Bob grew up in Beecher, Ill.

"My dad was very involved with the church, and he made sure we all got to go to the Lutheran school that we had, K-8," he said.



But Bob had a special place in his heart for public school, as well. He taught in the Rapid City public schools for many years, walking the halls in Black Hawk, Dakota Middle School, Valley View Elementary School. He finished his career as a full-time assistant principal at North Middle School, where he worked 1996-2004.

Even when the church and school were still at the 5th and Quincy location, the Herzes (along with other Zion members) knew that size was an issue for the church/school. One of the classrooms was in the basement, and school sports teams would have to borrow other elementary school gyms around town to practice and host games. (For a time, Bob coached 5th and 6th grade basketball with the late Rick Kirschenmann, a longtime Zion member.)

That's partly why the move from 5th and Quincy to the top of the hill where Zion currently sits was such a God-driven thing, she said.

"The way you saw God working through the impossibilities of that move," she said, "all the things that had to fall into place to make the move happen."

Bob and Marilyn recall that the first church service at Zion's current location was held outside, on the grass.

"Was there grass?" Marilyn pondered aloud.

"Well, there were weeds," Bob replied.

Now, with seven grandkids ranging from age two to 18 and their three kids living in three states, the Herzes stay busy traveling between family members and supporting their children and their children's families. Daughter, Jen, is a coowner of Clothes Mentor just north of I-90. Most days Bob and Marilyn are there, tracking and managing inventory. They have hosted small group Bible studies since the early 1990s and love to make connections between Zion members and people they know.
