

## The Perfect Kind of Love on Valentine's Day!



Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God, and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God. Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love. (1 John 4:7-8).

In the darkness of the bleak cold winter, February is the month of bright love. Valentine's Day often brings to mind romantic dinners, heartfelt cards, and expressions of affection. While these are beautiful and fitting celebrations, they only scratch the surface of what love truly means in the Christian life. For us, love is not merely a fleeting emotion or human ideal but is grounded in the very nature of God Himself. As Lutherans, we understand love through the

lens of sola gratia (grace alone) and solus Christus (Christ alone), where Christ is both the source and perfect example of true, sacrificial love.


John's words in his first epistle remind us that love originates in God. The Greek word agape, used here, signifies a selfless, unconditional love—a love that desires the good of the other without expecting anything in return. This is the love we see poured out on the cross, where Christ died for us "while we were still sinners" (Romans 5:8). In His atoning sacrifice, Jesus demonstrates the fullness of agape love: sacrificial, enduring, and redeeming. Our love for one another is not a means to earn God's favor but a grateful response to the unmerited grace we have received.

As Martin Luther taught, Christian love flows outward. In his *Freedom of a Christian*, Luther explains that faith makes us "perfectly free lords of all, subject to none," but also "perfectly dutiful servants of all, subject to all." This paradox highlights the tension and beauty of Christian love: We are freed from sin to love others freely, not for selfgain but for their sake. Such love is radical in its humility and service. It seeks to bear the burdens of others, just as Christ bore ours.

In our everyday lives, this kind of love is often expressed in small, unseen ways. It is the patience of a parent with a restless child, the forgiveness shared between friends, the provision of food for a neighbor in need, the listening ear given to someone in pain, the lavish love of a wonderful congregation poured out on a new pastor and his wife! These acts are not insignificant; they are the very embodiment of Christ's love working through us. As Luther emphasized, our good works are not performed to achieve righteousness but flow naturally as fruit of our faith in Christ.

On this Valentine's Day, let us remember that our love for one another is rooted in the love God has first shown us. We love because He loved us (1 John 4:19). Whether in marriage, family, friendship, or community, our relationships are sustained and sanctified by this divine love. Love is not always easy, nor is it without sacrifice. But it is precisely in the giving of ourselves for others that we reflect Christ, who gave Himself completely for us.

On this Valentine's Day, may the words of 1 Corinthians 13 ring true: Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends! (1 Corinthians 13:7-8). In Christ, this love is made perfect. Amen.

#### **DISCIPLESHIP FOCUS: Blood Drive**

Many of us like to begin our days in prayer, asking God to use us, as He sees fit, and to help us realize how He is using us. One way God can use you beyond what you could imagine is by giving blood.

My name is Roxi Withee, and I am Zion's current coordinator for our blood drives. Dave Heard coordinated our drives for over a decade, with Allison Flaherty taking over before I joined her. I asked Aubrey at Vitalant if she could look at Zion's history of blood drives, to find any information about our past giving. She was excited to compile the facts and share them with us!

Aubrey was able to go back as far as 2005. From 2005 until 2011, Zion had six blood drives a year. In 2012 we moved to three drives per year. This allowed those who give doubles to donate every time. (Blood donors who give doubles have to wait a longer period between donations than those who do not give doubles.) All told, Zion has hosted 75 blood drives, with the average drive bringing in 25 donors.

The most important number to digest: Our Zion donors have given over 1, 500 lifesaving units of blood!

Think about that! An hour of your time can help save lives. Some of our donors have given almost 100 units! In August of last year, two 17-year-olds began giving. Imagine how they can help over their lifetimes! We like to have our drives during the school year in hopes that it encourages parents of school children to give. And we love that the children see and learn how important giving blood is.

Another wonderful number that is growing is our donors per drive. Thirty donors gave during our August 2024 blood drive, and we didn't have enough room to fit in everyone who wanted to give. So, Aubrey has added slots and workers so we can accommodate more donors. Upcoming Zion blood drives are April 29th, and one on September 9th. Please consider giving, even if you haven't before. #### **MINISTRY FOCUS: Ministry through Music**

The music ministry at Zion is a blessing of opportunity to serve and worship God, express praise, share biblical truths, and be encouraged in our faith through song.

Zion is blessed to have many talented individuals willing to share their time and gifts to make music happen at worship services every week.

The music ministry currently includes organists/pianists, a choir, a handbell choir, a praise team, and opportunities for special music by congregation members. Zion does not have a music director on

staff. Therefore, it relies on members to play organ, participate in praise team, and direct and participate in choir and handbells. Pastor Meadows selects hymns that align theologically with each week's readings and approves music suggested by the praise team.

"I love that we have different ways of worshipping and expressing our praise, thanks and joy," said praise team director and special music coordinator, Kate Meadows. "Music is just one facet of a worship service, and no one style is more important than another."

Zion's choir recently put out a call for additional participants and now includes 18 members. Leadership of the choir is shared by Martha Palmreuter, who stepped into the director role two years ago, and Marilyn Herz, who makes the music selections. The choir is always eager to welcome new singers. The choir practices on Wednesday evenings.

The handbell choir was able to return with their musical praise in November 2024, after an ardent search for a new director. Mike Beason is the current director. There are currently 11 members. Practices take place on Monday evenings.

Zion's praise team was restructured to one cohesive team after the COVID-19 pandemic. The praise team provides music at the Sunday 10:45 a.m. services at least twice monthly and generally includes musicians on

keyboard, guitar, drums, and vocals. The team currently has about 15 members who participate as fits their individual schedules.

"We're always looking for more musicians," said Kate.

A unique feature of Zion's music ministry is the addition of special music during services. As special music coordinator, Kate has been very encouraging to congregation members who have an interest in sharing their musical gifts in service. All musicians, from beginner to seasoned orchestra musician, are invited to participate in the music ministry. During Christmas Eve services in December, six special music performances were shared!

About the increased participation of special music, Kate said, "It's been really fun to see people stepping up. It's special when someone takes the time to prepare a piece of music and shares it with their church family."


#### Meet Kayla Leininger

Kayla Leininger joined us at the beginning to this school year. I got to meet Kayla recently as we sat together for an interview, and I could quickly feel a connection with this lovely young woman. Thank you, Daxton! Kayla has three nephews: Daxton; Ryder (in Mrs. Leyden's afternoon preschool class at Zion); and Jhett, who is one.

Kayla was born in St. Joseph, MO, but moved at a young age, and she has lived in a number of different states. She grew up as the middle child in a pastor's family, with an older sister and a younger brother. Her mom was a stay-at-home mom before teaching 1st grade.

Kayla graduated from Dakota Wesleyan in Mitchell, SD, and for the past 9 years, she has been a kindergarten teacher, most recently at Dakota Christian School near



Kayla said one of the most memorable events of her life happened just last year when she accompanied her parents on a 10-day mission trip to Mozambique, sponsored by her dad's church, Calvary Assembly of God in Sioux Falls. They built churches, dug wells and served in villages and at orphanages. Kayla said one of the most impactful parts for her was at the orphanage when the children said, "Welcome to the home that God has blessed us with." They have nothing, they sleep 2 kids to every twin bed and yet they are so thankful for what God has given them. She carries that knowledge of being blessed in her heart.

I asked Kayla a couple of questions, one being, "What do you remember most about your own kindergarten experience?" She promptly replied that she remembers crying—every day! She must have had a lot of separation anxiety for a while, but she said that looking forward to wearing a special gingerbread dress for the Christmas program changed all that, and the rest of the school year was a lot more fun.

Who are you? This is the question Kayla wants each of her students able to answer as they graduate from her class. She has the sign posted just inside the classroom door, with the following lines below that question: "I am chosen," "I am loved," "I have a purpose," "God has a plan," "I matter" and "I am a child of God." Each day they talk about one of these aspects of, "Who are you?"

The last thing I asked Kayla was what she would like to say to you, the folks of Zion, and she said that she is gratified by the wonderful community support she sees here, people working together and being supportive of one another. Such will be the case later this year as Ashley transfers to Vance Air Force Base in Enid, Oklahoma. Teagan will finish out her first grade year at Zion while Kolton continues to work at Ellsworth. Barring any hiccups, Kolton and Teagan will join Ashley in Oklahoma this coming summer.

But while in Rapid City, Zion serves an easy and familiar fit for the Aring family. Ashley attended a Lutheran school as a child, and sending their daughter to Zion to begin her elementary school years was not a hard decision.

Zion, says Ashley, has been a perfect fit for Teagan.

"She took to it so well," she said.

Ashley says she has already pinpointed a potentially good church home in Oklahoma. But in the long run, they have their eye on returning to Rapid City.

Time will tell. If they do come back, Zion will be waiting for them.

### **CONGREGATION MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: The Bunge Family**

The Bunge family's membership at Zion Lutheran Church goes back at least 5 generations.

Elizabeth (Kiehn) Bunge (1905-2009) was a long-time member of Zion. Many remember Elizabeth, also known as Betty, for her delicious pies, her crocheting and quilting, her African violets and for sharing her flowers and produce from her garden. She was also a long-time cook at Tally's Restaurant (now Tally's Silver Spoon). Elizabeth and her three sons, Merle, Darrell, and Glenn, attended church at Zion's first location, on the corner of 5th and Quincy. Merle, Darrell and Glenn were all confirmed at Zion in the 1940's. Merle (1929 – 1996) continued to attend Zion with his family over the years. Darrell and Glenn both moved away from Rapid City.

Merle married Marcene Paseka in 1954. Marcene says she remembers attending Christmas Eve services with the Bunge family during her high school years. As she and Merle were to be married, Marcene was baptized and confirmed at Zion. Marcene belonged to many Bible study groups and has helped prepare for and serve at funerals over the years. Merle and Marcene had three children: Wayne, Gene and Carol. All three were baptized and confirmed at Zion.

Wayne married Jan Weber (1954-2018) in 1982. They have three children. Wayne continues to be a member of Zion.

Gene and Karen (Andrick) were married at Zion in 1988. Their three children, Heather, Matthew and Audrey, were all baptized and confirmed at Zion. All three also attended Zion Lutheran School for their elementary years. The family continues their membership and worship at Zion. Heather and Zac Boysen were married at Zion. The couple has two children: Bailey (3) and new baby, Tate. Three-year-old Bailey attends Sunday school for preschoolers.

Carol married Don Turner in 1989, and they renewed their vows with Pastor Duley in celebration of their 26th wedding anniversary. They have one daughter, Melissa, who was also baptized and confirmed at Zion. She attended Zion Lutheran School for 5th and 6th grade. Melissa married Austin Kaul at Zion. They have two sons, Hunter (in Kindergarten at Zion School) and Brody (18 months). They are expecting a third child in May. They, too, worship at Zion, where Austin serves on the Board of Trustees and on the praise team.



Many family memories have been made over the years at Zion for the Bunges. A family favorite is the tradition of taking part in the Sunday school's Christmas Eve program, which Zion used to host regularly. The familiarity of the Christmas gospel recited by the children and the songs sung at these services will never be forgotten.
