Drop a note or make a call to the church office if you know that you will be in the hospital, or if you know of a member of our church family in the hospital.

We also need people to prepare and deliver meals. This isn't an arduous task, but is a great way to help others in our church family. In so doing, you are giving the most valuable asset—your time, time that God has given you, allowing you to serve your brother or sister in Christ.

Random Question with...



MINISTRY FOCUS: Christ's Way Capital Campaign Committee

It might be hard to believe, but two years have passed since Zion launched its Capital Campaign for Zion Lutheran Church, School and Preschool. Directed by the expert guidance of Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) representative Phill Andreasen, the campaign is organized into three phases, with an overall goal of responding to the needs of a growing Lutheran school and church congregation. As we enter the third and final year of the first phase of giving, here is an update of what the Capital Campaign committees are up to and what has been accomplished thus far:

According to Impact Phase Director Kevin Aker, Phase 1 of the campaign begins its final year celebrating a huge milestone. Thanks to Zion's incredible giving efforts, the campaign reached the million-dollar mark in October 2024.

"Through difficult times seeing prices for our daily goods rise out of control, your dedication to both the current ministry and Zion's future ministry has held fast," Kevin said. "We have not done this on our own, of course. We continue to trust in and thank God for maintaining our ability to do this."

Phase 1 of the campaign aims to raise enough money to support the building of additional classrooms and a gym at Zion. It is no secret that every inch of Zion Lutheran Church, School and Preschool is well utilized and, in some cases, over-utilized. The PE closet doubles as storage for music stands and speakers. The general educator (Becki Aker) works out of a former closet. Preschoolers take naps in the conference room. The narthex transforms into the school cafeteria midday during the weekdays. The sanctuary is also the school gym. Adding additional classroom space will allow Zion Lutheran School to increase its enrollment numbers. The addition of a gym will allow the current sanctuary/gym to become a dedicated worship space.

Bill Aker and Don Valenti are the Capital Campaign Committee's co-chairs. Their work was heavy leading up to the beginning of the campaign, as they met with Andreasen and other subcommittee leaders to discuss how to organize a capital campaign to raise money for a church and school expansion.

"When we started, we felt like the blind leading the blind," Bill said. "The campaign was an education for everyone."

Various Zion members took on various roles to get the monstrous campaign rolling. Ken Anderson assumed the role of prayer director. Lynette Epp agreed to head up communications. Amie Rose tracked pledges for initial commitments.

"There was a lot of coordinating to do," Bill said. "It was a lot to ask people to do. But everyone that we asked stepped up and did, I think, a really good job."


Now, as Zion praises God for reaching the million-dollar mark, a building committee is meeting regularly to determine the most practical layout of the new addition and draft expansion plans. Contractors will break ground on the project once 55% of the total project cost is attained. God willing, Zion could see a ground-breaking ceremony in the spring of 2026.

As Campaign co-chairs, Bill Aker and Don Valenti continue to maintain a regular presence within the congregation, introducing themselves to new members and keeping the Capital Campaign front-and-center.

"New members [often] don't know anything about the history of Zion," Bill said.

Kevin Aker of the Impact Phase Team says to be on the lookout for more Capital Campaign events in the coming months.

CONGREGATION MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: Kathie Wold



Asking Kathie Wold how long she has been a member of Zion Lutheran Church is like asking how long she has been a member of her family. The easy answer: since she was born.

But here is the more interesting answer: Kathie Wold was baptized in the parsonage on Quincy Street while Zion Lutheran Church was being built on 5th and Quincy – the corner that Security First Bank now occupies. Less than a year after her baptism, the church building was completed. Her father, the late Erwin Kirschenmann, was among the church leaders instrumental in starting Zion Lutheran School in the 1950s.

When the school opened in 1957, it served grades 1-4, with each grade taking up one row of the classroom and one teacher overseeing all the students. Kathie was in first grade and therefore sat in the first row. Her brother, Rick, was in the third grade and sat in the third row.

The family's legacy at Zion continues strong today.

Aside from four years of what Kathie calls "penance" in New Jersey, where Richard worked as an engineer and where both Hanne and Kirre were born, she and Richard have spent their married lives in Rapid City. Kathie taught English at Dakota Middle School for more than 20 years, working in the same brick building where, years earlier, she graduated from the original Rapid City High School. (Rapid City Alternative High School occupies the space today.) She was on the middle school team that introduced online grading to the Rapid City School system in the early 2000s. She retired from teaching in 2011.

Teaching may have been her bread-and-butter job, but she says she always wanted to be a coach. Having earned a degree in PE from Valparaiso University, she played women's fast-pitch softball for 15 years, played on the Pierre women's softball team for two years and coached middle school basketball and volleyball for 20-plus years.

Kathie met Richard in the early 1980s. She was impressed with Richard's vocabulary, and after their first meeting, she says she thought to herself, "That's someone I could marry."

They were married in 1982.

In their decades at Zion, Kathie and Richard and the extended Kirschenmann family have made incredible contributions to support church music, worship and the school. Kathie's parents purchased the handbells and, for school and Sunday school children, the colored chimes. They also ensured that the handbells were cleaned regularly. Keyboards for Zion's praise team and special music were purchased with funds from the Kirschenmann family memorial. Kathie and Richard purchased banners to hang on either side of the altar. Kathie served on the long-range planning committee at Zion in the early 1990s under Pastor Duley, which saw the initial formation of Zion's Praise Team. She also chaired the worship committee and introduced CCLI to support the use of music not found in hymnals. Richard has served as Zion's Vice President and on the former Board of Outreach (now Board of Discipleship). For the Christ's Way Capital Campaign, the Wolds served on the Inspire Committee, connecting and communicating with Zion members over Zion's fundraising efforts.

Zion wouldn't be the same without Kathie and Richard Wold. We give thanks to God for their decades of serving Zion in love!
